With goodies in hand and bikes parked we hung out for a good half an hour watching the games. It was a blast! As we left we noticed a little park just west of the fields. - 1. We started at 300 E and Center Street. From there take 300 E to 200 S
- 2. Take a right (go west) on 200 S until you get to 900 W
- Take a left (go south) on 900 W. Make sure to check out the old foundry just past the railroad tracks. Take 900 W until 600 S
- 4. Take a right (go west) on 600 S go under I-15 until 1100 W
- 5 Take a left (go north) on 1100 W and follow it down to 1150 S
- 6. Take a right on 1150 S. If you follow this road down you will find the baseball fields and Footprinter Park. Enjoy, but do not think this is all. There are tons of awesome little roads back here so make sure to take some time and explore.

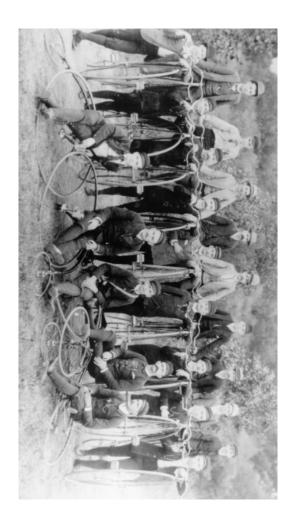

My Top 5 Provo Rides

1. Best Date = A ride on the Provo River Trail. This summer, going up the canyon is better than going to the lake due to construction. Tandem is not required. (Beginner)
2. Best Cruise = Anywhere in the square between 800 N, University Ave, Center St, and 900 E. Try to stay away from 400 E (always a little dangerous). Swing into the library and check out the cool architecture. (Beginner)
3. Best for Summer = Type "7-11 Provo Ut" into Google. Now click "Maps." See that dot closest to you house? Get on your bike ride there and get a Slurpee. You can thank me later. (Beginner)

- 4. Best Escape = Find a bike friendly way to get to Kuhni Blvd. (avoid University Ave. The bridge is not bicycle friendly). Ride Kuhni Blvd to Springville. Once in Springville, you can turn around or you can follow Center St. in Springville to their downtown which has restaurants and cool shops. (Intermediate)
- 5. Best Challenge = There are actually two. For the less sporty, you can ride your bike up South Fork. Gentle climbs, beautiful scenery, and a couple of parks make this ride perfect. For you go-getters out there, grab your bike and ride up Squaw Peak Road. This ride is not for the faint of hear or the faint of legs, but it is well worth it once you get to the top. I make it a point to ride up Squaw at least once a year on my fixie, so if you have a few gears you can do it. (Intermediate/Advanced)
